

Florida Society Treasurer

Thank you for placing me in such an important position. I look forward to working with the new Executive Board.

I will do my upmost to follow faithfully in the footsteps of those before me and of Christopher Memminger as well. He was as one of only 3 men who served as Treasurer for the Confederate States of America.

Here is a little history of money during the war:

Mr. Memminger was the first Secretary of the Treasury for our beloved south. When Jefferson Davis formed his first cabinet, Memminger was appointed Secretary of the Treasury on February 21, 1861. It was a difficult task in view of the Confederacy's financial challenges. He served unlit July 1864 facing extreme difficulties trying to keep the Confederacy afloat. His face was placed upon the 5-dollar bill.

Confederate Treasury Notes were hand signed by various clerks, with exception of the 50 cent issues that had the printed signatures of Robert Tyler and Edward C. Elmore. The first six notes issued were hand signed by the Register and Treasurer themselves. While hand signatures were considered an anti-counterfeiting tool, the sheer number of bills being produced could not reasonably be signed individually by two men each. Women were often hired as clerks to sign "for Register" and "for Treasurer". Up to 200 clerks were eventually hired for each.


Emiline Piggot Chapter 24 Cindy Pennington, President

Florida Society of the Order of the Black Rose Carol Grimmer, Keeper of the Right

History of the Order of Black Rose

At the NCOCR convention in Charlotte, the "Society of the Black Rose" was approved by the members as part of the state organization.

The goals were to organize a statewide network to help with the memorial services, to

enlighten the men and ladies to proper persona, to offer services or assist with services locally and statewide, and services in other states by invitation. The structure was setup to have a "Keeper of the Rite" who would serve as a contact person and keeper of the services that can be adopted to help the SCV or anyone honoring a Confederate veteran or a Confederate Memorial in their region. She would have a list of members and their phone numbers. She would make calls when widows were needed.

The Black Rose was named in honor of the greatest widow in the Confederacy who risked her personal safety for the Confederate Cause and lost her life trying to help The Cause, Rose O'Neal Greenhow.

- Requirements for Membership in the Society of the Black Rose.
- Black Rose members must be a member of the OCR.
- Members must have a complete period mourning outfit (Period appropriate partial mourning is also acceptable.

WHAT IS THE OCR?

What is the OCR? What exactly do you do? What is your purpose? Questions I am often asked. I have been giving it some serious thought as to how to best answer these inquiries.

First, the Order of Confederate Rose is a support group for the Sons of Confederate Veterans, helping with their social & benevolent functions. But we are so much more than that, - we have our own agenda as well. Chapters of the OCR raise funds to purchase flags for the Flags across Florida project. To date we have supplied flags for White Springs and the Confederate Park Flag site in Tampa. We have placed a memorial plaque for Rose O'Neal Greenhow and a granite bench at Confederate Park as well. We strive to protect our monuments, southern culture and heritage. We march in parades, provide living history, we teach about our heritage, but most importantly we are visible in our communities in a positive light.

In the past several years we have provided school supplies to small rural schools. Helping teachers educate our youth. We have donated clothing to women's shelters across the state. Toys for Tots, food drives & roadside cleanups are just a few of the civic activities of the OCR. We support a scholarship for the Sam Davis Youth Camp. We believe that our youth are our tomorrow.
